Two days before we sent our last edition, United HealthCare CEO Brian Thompson was shot and killed in Manhattan. This caused a flurry of reaction both on and off-line; as facts were still coming in, we decided to not include the story nor make a statement. However, what was apparent was that healthcare and its impact on the working class were discussed more in the 24 hours after the shooting than it was in the entirety of the 2024 presidential campaign race. In the time since, and especially after a suspect was arrested, there have been countless articles, TV reports, and memes — this <u>New York Magazine subheadline</u> is concise: "A coldblooded murder has become, to many, an opportunity to vent." Labor Community Services of Los Angeles has set up a <u>fire relief fund</u>. In partnership with the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor, their ongoing mission is to "provide a safety net for union members, whether it be through the food program, disaster relief fund, or financial literacy."

Finally, we mark the passing of President Jimmy Carter, who died on December 29th at age 100. We honor his post-presidential years devoted to philanthropy and the pursuit of human rights and world peace.

However, <u>his presidency was marred by a number of actions</u> that presaged the anti-worker climate that was cemented in the Reagan years. Not least among them, Carter presided over the failure to enact an historic healthcare reform. He opposed the Kennedy National Health Insurance Bill which was endorsed by the AFL-CIO and almost the entire labor movement and proposed an anemic alternative that would have preserved private insurers and employment-based health coverage. The UAW and several other unions refused to endorse him in the 1980 Democratic primaries because of his opposition to the Kennedy Bill.

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Our funding comes from unions and individuals who believe that labor must lead the way for healthcare justice!

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As true and as timely as ever

Each January we include a quote from Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. which is often cited imprecisely as: "Of all the forms of inequality, injustice in health care is the most shocking and inhumane." On this particular holiday honoring Rev. Dr. King, we're sharing the <u>full, accurate quote</u>:

"We are concerned about the constant use of federal funds to support this most notorious expression of segregation. Of all the forms of inequality, injustice in health is the most shocking and the most inhuman because it often results in physical death. I see no alternative to direct action and creative nonviolence to raise the conscience of the nation." — March 1966, at a press conference before speaking at the Medical Committee for Human Rights, in Chicago.

In Memoriam – Nancy Wohlforth

We lost one of our own on December 31st: Nancy Wohlforth, a pioneering labor leader and gay rights activist, passed away after a long illness. Her remarkable list of titles throughout her career included Secretary-Treasurer of the Office and Professional Employees International Union, Vice President of the California Labor Federation, and Founder and former President of Pride at Work – she was the first openly gay member of the AFL-CIO Executive Council, and she co-founded U.S. Labor Against War.

A longtime leader in the health justice movement, she sat on the Labor Campaign for Single Payer's national advisory board.

Our Ongoing Mission

Every time workers negotiate a contract, our health benefits are a target. The boss wants us to pay more, get less coverage, and give up more wage increases.

It doesn't have to be that way. Through an improved "Medicare for All" we can take healthcare off the table and guarantee workers comprehensive benefits including:

- mental health
- reproductive health
- dental

medical

- long-term care
- vision
- hearing

All with no out-of-pocket costs!

Workers can have healthcare through a single public system, so employers will have less leverage, and we can have the freedom to change jobs and the power to bargain for higher wages, better pensions, the hours we need, and other improvements in working conditions.

Medicare for All means that wealthy corporations could no longer routinely strip their frontline workers' health insurance as their first tactic during strikes. Our collective organizing will not be up against businesses determined to avoid the cost of union benefit health plans, and unions can focus on other key economic improvements and providing supplemental benefits.

No one likes their health *insurance* company; we like the familiarity of our trusted *providers* and the security of our coverage. Under single payer, we would have complete choice of provider, without worry of losing our doctor or getting stuck with surprise charges. Prescription drug costs will be lower, and we'll get the prescriptions our doctor orders — not just the ones insurance pays for. No "pre-authorization," no premiums.

Single Payer Healthcare / "Medicare for All" would provide everyone in the U.S. with the healthcare we need and deserve; not "access," but guaranteed healthcare. All without copays, deductibles, out-of-network expenses, or denial of coverage — in fact, you would never get a bill.

If all that sounds too good to be true, it's because for-profit insurance companies, corporate hospital chains and prescription drug companies have spent billions from our premiums to buy political influence, shape the media stories, and deceive us.
